Summer Schedule

Starting June 8th, the feast of Pentecost, we'll do something different in our parish. Instead of the usual two Divine Liturgies on Sunday morning, we'll have one at 10am followed by fellowship and a short faith education session (services on Saturday are unaffected). The month of June is busy with other things going on, so we'll start the faith education in July. A schedule of topics will be ready for next week.

In order to accommodate the language needs of our diverse parishioner base, the Liturgies will be bilingual however will alternate between being primarily-English and primarily-Ukrainian. The scripture readings will be taken in both languages. The regular service schedule will resume on September 14.

If there is a topic you'd like to hear about, let Fr. Michael know! The schedule isn't finalized yet.
