UBUNTU

In certain regions of south Africa, when someone does something wrong, he is taken to the centre of the village and surrounded by his tribe for two days while they speak of all the good he has done. They believe each person is good, yet sometimes we make mistakes, which is really a cry for help. They unite in this ritual to encourage the person to reconnect with his true nature. The belief is that unity and affirmation have more power to change behaviour than shame and punishment. This is known as Ubuntu – humility towards others.

The Least of My Brothers

Children are God's apostles, sent forth, day by day, to preach of love and hope and peace. - J.R. Lowell

A Guatemalan and I traveled on foot in the mountains. Because of our loads and the steep incline, we stopped under a mango tree to rest amid the cane houses of a tiny village. Soon curious children approached, innocent of the world of television, cartoons, and swing sets. They were the barefoot children of the cane houses with dirt floors. I sensed the expectation of a story... so I told them the "Big Mouth Frog" story, to which they reacted with unusual joy.

We peeled and divided oranges from our backpacks for the two dozen kids, until only half an orange remained for us. Then we saw her, the bashful one, the round-eyed girl of seven, half-hidden behind a crumbling adobe wall. We gave her the remaining half of the orange.

She said thanks, took the half orange, broke it into two parts, and gave half to her little brother and the other half to her little sister who was even more shy and hidden. She thanked us again and went off with nothing for herself...and we stood there with nothing left to give her.

A year later in the same area, I found myself with a family where the father was gravely ill. Sitting on the dirt floor of their smoky cornstalk house, we prayed together for their father. I stayed with the mother and a half dozen kids and we talked and prayed until darkness came.

I hadn't noticed when she crawled into my lap, but I remember wanting to tell the child that she needn't worry because things would get better. But I knew it would not get better. The truth was that things would probably get worse. I wanted to tell her brothers and sisters that they would go to school, and their father would live, and there would be plenty to eat, and...

That made me remember the wheat buns I had in my backpack. I knew that often these families went without eating, so I handed some of the buns to the mother and gave the last of them to the child in my lap. To my surprise, the child said thanks, took the bread, broke it, and gave it to her smaller brother and sister sitting beside us, and, although she had none left for herself, she expected nothing more.
