Prayer and Doing the Will of God

It terrifies me to hear young people say, "God told me to do this or that." It is easy to say, "I received all this in prayer," but unless it is checked by someone with a real knowledge of the spiritual life, such a statement will ring false.

I firmly believe that God inspires and draws people, but when he does, it invariably makes some kind of sense in terms of the circumstances surrounding that person's life. A woman wrote to see if she could join us. She was absolutely convinced she had a vocation in our community. When she arrived, it turned out that she also had a husband and five children. It didn't take much to figure out God's will in this situation!

Today, young people want to make pilgrimages. I'm all for pilgrimages. My mother made pilgrimages. She loved them and would readily walk two hundred miles or more to visit a shrine or holy place. But first the children had to be cared for. Then it had to be a time when my father was away and didn't need her. The household had to be in good order. Only then did my mother go. If any of those conditions were lacking, she wouldn't go.

This is how God normally works. He speaks to us, but what we hear must be checked in relation to our responsibilities and our particular way of life.
